Dear Friends,

In the past year, through the dedicated support of our Board of Directors and staff, we've again seen growth, resilience, and creativity in successful progress towards our mission - to work with communities for a healthy Middle Fork Willamette watershed through habitat restoration and youth education. It only moves forward because of our great team, and I'd like to acknowledge the thoughtful and patient leadership of our Operations Manager Karen Sarno, who retired after 10 years of amazing work at the council. We'll miss her in the office but are grateful for the critical role she played in developing our policy handbook, updating fiscal processes, and keeping the organization running smoothly through numerous transitions.

Through strong partnerships, our program staff realized notable accomplishments throughout 2024. We received large awards for finalizing designs, planning, and permitting, toward floodplain restoration at Elijah Bristow State Park, and our Community Advisory Council continued its iterative process with our technical team and engineers to ensure that the restoration is supported by the broader community. New partnerships with The Freshwater Trust and the City of Westfir resulted in restoration of riparian habitat along the Middle Fork Willamette River mainstem, and we've leaned into collaborative spaces by supporting educational programming and communications strategy in the Urban Waters Partnership. It's amazing to witness our Regional Education Program's leadership in developing and coordinating accessible, place-based educational opportunities for rural and urban students in the Upper Willamette basin. It's incredibly fulfilling to work with our staff and Board of Directors. Please consider supporting the council and join us in growing our community of partners that look forward to the outcome, but also enjoy the process of working together along the way.

HABITAT RESTORATION AND REGIONAL EDUCATION

Community members continue to drive on-the-ground stewardship at Westfir Confluence Park. During the spring and fall of 2024, volunteers removed invasive blackberry root wads and invasive herbaceous plants before planting over 400 native trees and shrubs. We then contracted with Walama Restoration Project to plant 550 additional plants and spread 32 pounds of native seed to improve riparian habitat, improve water quality, and support native pollinators and wildlife species. Our team worked closely with partners at the US Forest Service and the Oakridge Trail Alliance to develop conceptual designs and cost estimates for an accessible trail and viewing platform in the park's riparian forest. Our team also celebrated reaching the milestone of 30% design iteration for the Elijah Bristow State Park Floodplain Restoration Project. Project designing continues as we work toward implementing floodplain restoration in 2027.

In 2024, staff identified new opportunities for expanding the WATERS Program to our partners at Oakridge HS and the Eugene 4J NATIVES Program. Through all of our program offerings, staff met students on the land to lead art in nature activities, student-led stewardship, fish and wildlife monitoring, and stream surveys. Outside of our own programs, we worked closely with partners at Forests Today and Forever, Grove ODS, Migrant Education ODS, Lane Education Service District, and the Willamette Resources and Education Network (WREN) to support activities that introduced students to the many diverse plant and animal species that inhabit our local watersheds, as well as career pathways in environmental science. Staff piloted a Firewise program with McKenzie River Community School, introducing students to the importance of fire safe designs and guiding them through the implementation of their own firewise landscaping projects. We look forward to another year leading and participating in programs that connect students to the land through activities that strengthen their relationships to themselves, their community, and the watershed.

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


